

Prohibited Medications

Individuals working offshore should be mindful that certain prescription and non-prescription drugs may have side effects, such as drowsiness, which could impact their ability to perform their jobs and jeopardize their own safety as well as the safety of others working offshore. The following list is commonly prescribed medications that may be prohibited for offshore duty at BP operated locations. This list is not all inclusive. If you are taking one of these medications or any other medication that you believe could impact your ability to safely work offshore, you should contact your employer and/or the BP medic assigned to your work location.
